Sing a new song to the LORD; sing to the LORD, all the earth. <sup>2</sup> Sing to Yahweh, praise His name; proclaim His salvation from day to day. <sup>3</sup> Declare His glory among the nations, His wonderful works among all peoples.

## GREAT IS THE LORD PSALM 96

This psalm is found in another version in 1 Chronicles 16:23-33, where parts of Psalm 96, Psalm 105 and Psalm 106 are used. It was common for Jewish leaders to combine portions of psalms to build their own psalm for a special occasion.

In the Chronicle version, the psalm (probably all three) are attributed to David. The heading of the Septuagint contains the same inscription.

In Chronicles, David is appointing some of the Levites to minister before the Ark of the Covenant. Some theologians see this combination being used again at the rededication of the Temple after Babylon.

Ultimately the psalm looks ahead to the Kingdom when the Messiah reigns among the Gentile nations who will now worship the God of Israel.

Indeed – the King is coming!
